PAPER – IX

1) MOOT COURT, FRE-TRIAL PREPARATION AND PARTICIPATION IN TRIAL PROCEEDING. 100 MARKS

(This paper will have 3 components of 30 marks each & viva for10 marks.)

A. Moot Court 30 Marks.

Every students will do at least three moot courts 10 marks for each. The moot Court's Work will assign problems and it will be evaluated for 5 marks for Written Submission and 5 marks for oral advocacy.

B. Observation of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal 30 Marks.

Students will attend two trails in the course. They will maintain daily diary and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the court assignment. This scheme will carry 30 marks.

C. Interviewing technique and pre-trail preparation.

The interviewing sessions of clients and lawyers will be recorded in diary. Each student will further observe the preparation of document and court papers by theAdvocate and the procedure for filing of the suit/petition will be recorded in diary which will carry 15 Marks.

D. The fourth component of this paper will be Viva-voce examination on all the above three

subjects. This will carry 10 Marks.

PAPER – X

DRAFTING, PLEADING AND CONVEYANCING

100 MARKS.

This course will be taught through Class instruction and simutation exercise preferably with assistance of practicing of law, lawyers/retired judges, apart from teaching the relevant provisions of law, the course will include 15 exercises in drafting carrying a total of 45 marks and exercises in 15 conveyancing another 45 marks (3 marks for each exercise) Note: (a) Drafting General Principles of drafting and relevant rules shall be taught. (b) Pleading (i) Civil, (ii) Plaint (iii) Written Statement, (vi) Interlocutory application (v) Original petition, (vi)Affidavit, (vii) Execution petition and (viii) memorandum of appeal and Revision, (ix) Petition U/s 226 and 32 of the constitution of India. (c) Criminal (i) Complaints, (ii) Criminal Miscellaneous petition, (iii) Bail Petition, (iv) Memorandum ofAppeal and Revision. (d) Conveyance – (i) Sale Deed (ii) Mortgage deed, (iii) Lease deed (iv) Promissory Note, (v) Power ofAttorney, (vi) Will The remaining 10 marks will be given in viva-voce examination which will test the understanding of legal practice in relation of drafting pleading and conveyancing. Students will maintain diaries and enter everything.
